"There are now 2.8% of the practice population on the GSF register – equating to 108 patients and a lot of those are dementia patients. Each of these patients has a named GP. We call them priority patients and we have a white board in reception with names on so that the reception staff know exactly who is on the list, who their named doctor is and that their needs should be prioritised." **Dr Carolyn Richardson, Rowhedge Medical Practice**



Average of 45% patients identified to be in last year of life in the Community Hospitals ranges from 31% to 56%



Key Achievements

50 Community Hospitals in 5 areas have completed GSF Hospitals programme, with 24 now accredited


Accredited Hospitals have:

- Increased the number of patients identified in their last year of life above 30% average
- Used Needs based coding to plan care for patients
- Offered Advance Care Planning discussions to most identified patients
- Reduced length of stay
- Improved communication to GPs and community
- Developed a hospital protocol to enable sustained long term quality improvement in all areas
